

HEMECRAFT DIVISION

1. Membership fees may be paid, and forms may be obtained and filled out, before the Fair or at the time entries are placed in the hall. Reception times for entries are Wednesday, September 23rd from 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m., and Thursday, September 24th from 8:00 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. Judging to begin at 10:30 a.m.
2. The membership fee entitles the exhibitor to enter any class of the Fair, provided that the exhibitor places only one entry per section. Violation could disqualify the exhibitor in the section and in other sections.
3. All exhibits must be the work of the exhibitor and must not have been previously exhibited at G.N.E.
4. No membership fee is required if the exhibitor is a resident of a long term care facility.
5. Mounting, if required, must be on Bristol board or the equivalent.
6. Space limitations may make it necessary to display only winning entries.
7. Entry tags must be attached to each entry securely, one for each entry. If you are a first time exhibitor in any section, please mark your tag for that section "NEW".
8. Exhibits, in the Agri-Cultural Building & Quonset Building, may be removed beginning at 4:00 p.m., Sunday. However, vehicles are NOT permitted up to the Buildings until the fair closes at 5:00 p.m.
9. Entry Forms, tags, and Prize Books may be picked up at the GNE Fair Office.
10. Ensure that all material samples required are attached securely to each entry. Failure to attach required samples will result in disqualification for that entry.

ONTARIO ASSOCIATION OF AGRICULTURAL SOCIETIES ANNUAL HAND QUILTED CHAMPIONSHIP QUILT COMPETITION

ELIGIBILITY RULES AND REGULATIONS

General Conditions:

- A. Entries must be solely made and hand quilted by the exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OAAS) to be eligible for this competition.
- B. Entry quilts must be a minimum of 324" measured on the perimeter (smaller quilts will not be eligible to proceed to the next level of competition)
- C. The winner's name and pattern to be displayed at the Fair on sign provided by OAAS.
- D. Judging will occur at local fairs and district levels. A Provincial Grand Champion Quilt will be selected at the Annual OAAS Convention.
- E. Upon making an entry into the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Quilt Competition, the Exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotional activities related to the competition.
- F. The winning Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Champion Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future District and/or Convention OAAS competition.

LOCAL FAIR COMPETITIONS:

1. Local fair is entitled to send only the Grand Champion Quilt, (min. 324" measured on the perimeter) judged the best of show of all hand quilted quilts to the District Competition OR If any entry wins GRAND CHAMPION or BEST of ALL ELIGIBLE QUILTS at more than one Fair, the other Fairs at which this quilt was entered and won, should enter their RESERVE CHAMPION or SECOND BEST OF SHOW OF ALL CLASSES quilt in the District Competition.

NOTE: If an Exhibitor wins GRAND CHAMPION or BEST of SHOW of ALL ELIGIBLE quilts at other than his/her own fair, or at more than one Fair, the Exhibitor must consider the Agricultural Society nearest his/her home address as the one from which the quilt will be sent to the District meeting.

1. An Exhibitor who wins more than one Best of Show title with a different quilt at different Fairs shall be entitled to enter each winning quilt to compete at the District Competition.
2. Local Homecraft Divisions are requested to judge a GRAND CHAMPION or BEST of SHOW of all ELIGIBLE quilts. As well as RESERVE Grand Champion or SECOND Best of Show of all ELIGIBLE quilts.

The GRAND CHAMPION and the RESERVE GRAND CHAMPION are judged from all first and second prize ELIGIBLE quilts.

DISTRICT COMPETITIONS:

1. Judging quilts at the District Competitions will be the responsibility of each OAAS District.
2. The first place winning hand quilted quilt from the District Competition is eligible to enter the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Championship Quilt Competition at their Annual Convention. In cases where the winner of the District First Prize Quilt decides not to enter the Final Championship Competition, the Second Prize quilt winner at the District Competition will be eligible.
3. The Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies will award a ribbon and each district will award prize money of \$25 for first Place, \$15 for second and \$10 for third place to exhibitors of winning hand quilted quilts at each District Competition.
4. District results must be registered on the OAAS Championship Quilt Entry Form, returned to the OAAS c/o Vince Brennan, by December 1st. Provincial Competition:

PROVINCIAL COMPETITIONS:

1. Judges who officiate the Championship Quilt Competition at the Annual Convention will be appointed by the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies.
2. All quilts, entered in the competition must be hand quilted.
3. All quilt entries must be received for judging by the Competition Coordinator in the designated room between 7:30am to 8:30am on Friday of the Annual Convention of the OAAS.
4. The Competition Coordinator will assign a number for each entry. Entries will only be identified by this number during the judging process.
5. No Exhibitor shall be permitted to place or attach any Fair or other Exhibition identification on their quilt entry. Please remove all tags, ribbons, etc.
6. No persons other than the judges and designated officials will be permitted to enter the designated judging room until after the quilt judging and winner has been announced.
7. Any Exhibitor or any person acting on behalf of the Exhibitor who violates any of the Rules and Regulations or who interferes with the judges or the judging process shall be disqualified and the quilt will be removed from the competition.
8. No quilt exhibit shall be removed from the display viewing area until the official closing of the viewing room and designated time of pick up.
9. The OAAS shall not be held liable for any loss occasioned by fire, theft, accident, condition of quilt, the negligence of other Exhibitors, officials or otherwise.
10. Any protests must be made to the Homecraft Committee of the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies in writing within 5 working days after the last day of the Convention.
11. The entry judged BEST of SHOW at the February Convention will be declared the OAAS CHAMPIONSHIP QUILT. A \$500.00 GRAND PRIZE will be awarded and the Exhibitor will retain ownership of the quilt. A certificate and ribbon will also be awarded to the winner. A \$100 RESERVE GRAND PRIZE will be awarded and the Exhibitor will retain ownership of the quilt.

ONTARIO ASSOCIATION OF AGRICULTURAL SOCIETIES
ANNUAL MACHINE-QUILTED QUILT COMPETITION

ELIGIBILITY, RULES AND REGULATIONS:

General Conditions:

- A. Quilt must be solely made and machine quilted by the exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OAAS) fair to be eligible for this competition.
- B. Quilt to be measured on the perimeter. Total perimeter measurement to be a minimum of 324 inches. Note the quilt can be square, rectangular etc.

C. Judging will occur at local fairs and district levels. A Provincial Grand Champion Machine Quilted Quilt will be selected at the Annual OAAS Convention.

D. Upon making entry into the OAAS Machine Quilting Competition, the Exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotional activities related to the competition.

E. The winning OAAS Machine Quilted Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future District and/or OAAS Provincial competition.

F. The winner's name to be displayed at the Fair on sign provided by OAAS.

G. Quilt must have visible machine quilting.

LOCAL FAIR COMPETITIONS:

1. Each local fair is entitled to send only one Grand Champion Machine-Quilted Quilt, judged best of show of all eligible machine quilted Quilt to the District Competition OR If any entry wins Grand Champion or Best of Show of all eligible Machine-Quilted Quilts at more than one Fair, the other Fairs at which this item was entered and won, should enter their Reserve Champion or Second Best of Show of eligible Machine-Quilted Quilt in the District Competition.

NOTE: If an Exhibitor wins Grand Champion or Best of Show of all eligible Machine-Quilted classes at other than his/her own fair, or at more than one Fair, the Exhibitor must consider the Agricultural Society nearest his/her home address as the one from which the Quilt will be sent to the District competition.

2. An Exhibitor who wins more than one Best of Show title with a different machine quilted Quilt at different Fairs shall be entitled to enter each winning Quilt to compete at the District Competition.

3. Local Homecraft Divisions are requested to judge a Grand Champion or Best of Show of all eligible Machine-Quilted Quilt as well as a Reserve Champion or Second Best of Show of eligible Machine-Quilted Quilt.

The Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion are judged from all first and second prize ELIGIBLE machine quilted Quilts.

DISTRICT COMPETITIONS:

1. Judging at the District Competitions will be the responsibility of each OAAS District.

2. The first place winning machine quilted Quilt from the District Competition is eligible to enter the OAAS Championship Machine Quilting Competition at the Annual Convention. In cases where the winner of the District first prize machine quilted Quilt decides not to enter the Final Championship Competition, the Second Prize Quilt winner at the District Competition will be eligible.

3. The Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies will award a ribbon and the District will award prize money of \$25.00 for first place, \$15.00 for second place and \$10.00 for third place to exhibitors of winning machine quilted Quilts at each District Competition.

4. District entries must be registered on the OAAS Championship Machine Quilting Entry Form, returned to the OAAS Office Manager by December 1.

PROVINCIAL COMPETITION:

1. Judges who officiate at the Championship Machine Quilting Competition at the Annual Convention will be appointed by the OAAS.

2. All articles entered in the competition must be machine quilted.

3. All entries must be received for judging by the competition coordinator in the designated room between 7:30am to 8:30am on the Friday of the Annual Convention of OAAS.

4. The competition coordinator will assign a number for each entry. This number will only identify entries during the judging process.

5. No exhibitor shall be permitted to place or attach any Fair or other Exhibitor identification on his or her entry. Please remove all tags, ribbons, etc.

6. No persons other than the judges and designated officials will be permitted to enter the designated judging room until after the judging and winner has been announced.

7. Any Exhibitor or any person acting on behalf of the Exhibitor who violates any of the Rules and Regulations or who interferes with the judges or the judging process shall be disqualified and the entry will be removed from the competition.
8. No machine quilted Quilt shall be removed from the display viewing area until the official closing of the viewing room and designated time of pick up.
9. The OAAS shall not be held liable for any loss occasioned by fire, theft, accident, condition of article, the negligence of other Exhibitors, officials or otherwise.
10. Any protests must be made to the Homecraft Division of the OAAS in writing within 5 working days after the last day of the Convention.
11. The entry judged Best of Show at the February Convention will be declared the OAAS Champion Machine Quilted Quilt. A \$500.00 GRAND PRIZE will be awarded and the Exhibitor will retain ownership of the quilt. A certificate and ribbon will also be awarded to the winner. A \$100 RESERVE GRAND PRIZE will be awarded and the Exhibitor will retain ownership of the quilt.

IMPORTANT NOTES:

1. Notwithstanding Homecraft Rule #3, it is recognized that quilts have traditionally been made by cooperative effort, and they may be entered by individuals provided that credit is given to the person or persons who cooperated in the production. Such quilts will be eligible for prizes offered by the GNE, but will not be eligible for the OAAS competitions.
2. Credit must be given to the designer of the pattern used in any quilt. Please specify if it is own design, traditional design, or design made by another person. If designed by another person, be sure to have permission to display the design publicly.
3. Please read section specifications carefully - there are size requirements for many of the quilt sections. OAAS Competition standards have been revised.
4. Unless otherwise stated, quilts are to be hand quilted.
5. Please avoid use of straight pins (for labels, etc.).
6. All quilts larger than crib quilts must have a rod pocket at least 4" (10 cm.) in depth attached to top back. You must pin or baste on a temporary pocket if there is none on the quilt. This facilitates hanging and avoids damage to your quilt.

First or any prize will be awarded at the discretion of the judges.

PLEASE NOTE SECTIONS ESPECIALLY FOR YOUNG PEOPLE WHO MAKE QUILTS.

SECTIONS 001 to 009 must conform to the size rules for the OAAS Annual Championship Hand Quilt Competition:

Total perimeter must measure a minimum of 324" (822 cm.). Entries in these sections will be considered for the "Grand Champion" and "Reserve Champion" ribbons given to the quilts eligible to compete in this competition.

They must be hand quilted by the maker/ exhibitor to be eligible for the OAAS competition.

Credit must be given: please state if quilt is a sole effort or a group effort (include name of group or collaborator).

Prizes for these sections (unless otherwise mentioned) will be: 1st \$30, 2nd \$25, 3rd \$20.

We encourage you to incorporate the 2020 Fair theme "Barns on the Farm" in as many entries as possible.

2. **Harry Hamilton Construction: Applique quilt (hand appliqued) Prizes:** 1st: \$35, 2nd: \$25, 3rd: \$20

8. **Printed top or squares ("cheater") Prizes: 1st: \$30, 2nd: \$25, 3rd: \$20**
9. **Quilt: Exhibitor's choice, hand quilted by exhibitor. Prizes: 1st: \$30, 2nd: \$25, 3rd: \$20**

The following sections, 10-18 must conform to the size rules for the OAAS Machine Quilt Competition: Quilt to be measured on the perimeter. Total perimeter measurement to be a minimum of 324 inches (822 cm.). Note the quilt can be square, rectangular etc. They may be machine quilted by any type of machine. Entries in these sections will be considered for the "Grand Champion" and "Reserve Champion" ribbons given to the quilts eligible to compete in this competition. Only those machine quilted by the maker/exhibitor will be eligible for the OAAS Competition.

10. **Pieced quilt, machine quilted Prizes: 1st: \$30, 2nd: \$25, 3rd: \$20**
11. **Applique quilt, machine quilted. Prizes: 1st: \$30, 2nd: \$25, 3rd: \$20**
12. **Embroidered quilt (machine or hand embroidery), machine quilted. Prizes: 1st: \$30, 2nd: \$25, 3rd: \$20**
13. **Quilt made using more than one decorative technique, such as piecing, appliqué, embroidery, etc. in combination. Prizes: 1st: \$30, 2nd: \$25, 3rd: \$20**
14. **Traditional design, machine quilted. Prizes: 1st: \$30, 2nd: \$25, 3rd: \$20**
15. **Original design, machine quilted - Prizes: 1st: \$30, 2nd: \$25, 3rd: \$20** A quilt trending towards a modern design that takes from the traditional and expands setting, design, colour, etc. to create a non-traditional look.
16. **Paper pieced design, machine quilted. Prizes: 1st: \$30, 2nd: \$25, 3rd: \$20**
17. **Printed top or squares ("cheater"), machine quilted. Prizes: 1st: \$30, 2nd: \$25, 3rd: \$20**
18. **Quilt: Exhibitor's choice, machine quilted by exhibitor. Prizes: 1st: \$30, 2nd: \$25, 3rd: \$20**

The following three sections, 19-21, are open to quilt-makers 18 years and under. These quilts may be tied or quilted by hand or by machine. Minimum size 40" x 54" (121 x 152 cm).

19. **Pieced quilt Prizes: 1st: \$25, 2nd: \$20, 3rd: \$15**
20. **Appliqué quilt. Prizes: 1st: \$25, 2nd: \$20, 3rd: \$15**
21. **"Ragg" quilt. Prizes: 1st: \$25, 2nd: \$20, 3rd: \$15**
22. **Scrap Quilt – made with a variety of fabrics (which may include fabric recycled from garments). Prizes: 1st: \$25, 2nd: \$20, 3rd: \$15** If there is a story attached to the design and/ or fabrics, please include it. May be machine or hand quilted. Minimum perimeter 240"
23. **Any other pieced quilt with perimeter less than 324" but with minimum perimeter of 240". Hand quilted. Prizes: 1st: \$25, 2nd: \$20, 3rd: \$15**
24. **Any other pieced quilt with perimeter less than 324" but with minimum perimeter of 240". Machine quilted. Prizes: 1st: \$25, 2nd: \$20, 3rd: \$15**
25. **Quilt As You Go - blocks must be sewn together and quilted as the quilt progresses. Prizes: 1st: \$25, 2nd: \$20, 3rd: \$15** When the last block is completed so is the quilt. Minimum perimeter 240". May be machine or hand quilted.
26. **Modern Maker: Quilt in the modern style. Prizes: 1st: \$25, 2nd: \$20, 3rd: \$15** Should reflect traits such as exaggerated scale, use of negative space, alternate grid work, bright graphic colour pallets, no borders, asymmetry, improvisational piecing, etc. Minimum perimeter 240". Machine quilted
27. **Quilt made using more than one decorative technique. May include embroidery, applique, collage, etc. Prizes: 1st: \$25, 2nd: \$20, 3rd: \$15** Minimum perimeter of 240" but with perimeter under 324". Machine or hand quilted.
28. **Wall hanging - such as pictorial, medallion, three-dimensional, abstract, etc. Prizes: 1st: \$25, 2nd: \$20, 3rd: \$15**

Let your imagination run free with our 2020 fair theme - "Barns on the Farm". Must be prepared for hanging, with hanging device included. Minimum size 12" x 16" (30x40)

29. **Threads That Bind, Maxwell: Designer's choice quilt - no restrictions on textile, technique, shape. Prizes:** 1st: \$25 store voucher, 2nd: \$20 store voucher, 3rd: \$15 store voucher. Design innovation and originality expected. Minimum perimeter 240". Machine or hand quilted.
30. **Eileen & Donald McLean Memorial "Celebrating Our Youth" Prizes:** 1st: \$35, 2nd: \$25, 3rd: \$20 A youth bed or couch quilt suitable for a teenager, may reflect a sport, a hobby, an accomplishment, a team, etc. Minimum perimeter 200". Hand or machine quilted.
31. **Melfar Holdings: Quilt for My Friend's House. Prizes:** 1st: \$35, 2nd: \$25, 3rd: \$20 All entries to be donated to House. Will be ranked rather than judged. For any size of bed, in soft, machine-washable fabric, in colourful, cheerful designs. May be quilted by hand or machine. A quilt batt will be given, as a "thank you" for each entry.
32. **Susan McLeod: Novice (beginner quilter) Prizes:** 1st: \$25, 2nd: \$15, 3rd: \$10 First completed quilt. Lap or throw size, minimum perimeter 160". Hand or machine quilted.

Method:

Measure warm water, Butter, sugar, salt into mixing bowl. Add egg. Mix until combined. Add half the flour with the yeast mixed into the flour. Beat until smooth. Stir in additional flour to make a stiff batter.

Grease Bundt pan and dust with bread crumbs.

Microwave Apple slices 1 min (until blanched). Add brown sugar, cinnamon, nutmeg and melted butter. Spread evenly in Bundt pan. Spoon batter evenly over the apples. Cover; let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour.

Bake in hot oven (400°F), about 25 minutes, or until done. Remove from oven; let stand 10 minutes, then turn out of pan onto cinnamon sugar dusted plate. Cool.

Drizzle with confectioner's sugar frosting or dust with icing sugar. May be served warm.

Artisan Bread Recipe

6 1/2 cups unbleached Flour (1.625L)
1 1/2 tablespoons instant yeast (22 ml)
1 1/2 tablespoons kosher salt (22 ml)
3 cups lukewarm water

Method:

Measure flour, yeast and salt into a large mixing bowl (16 cup size).

Pour in the water and stir together until just moistened. Beat 40 strokes, scraping the bottom and the sides of the bowl until the dough forms a lumpy sticky mass.

Cover the bowl with plastic wrap and let rise at room temperature (72F/22C) in a draft free place for 2 hours or until the dough has doubled in volume and has a sponge like appearance.

Place dough on a floured surface, divide into two. Flour your hands. Working the dough as little as possible and adding flour as necessary, form each piece into a round.

Sprinkle cornmeal onto a cookie sheet (stone baking pan works great); transfer rounds onto pan. Cover with a tea towel and rest at room temperature for 40 minutes.

Make 5 slashes across bread top.

Bake at 450 F on middle rack for 20 - 25 minutes. On the lower rack, place a baking pan with 2 cups of hot water.

Remove from oven and transfer to cooling rack.

This bread is best eaten on the day it is made.
